THE Eskom Expo for Young Scientists (EEYS) is a non-profit organisation established with the aim to improve the scientific, technical, research and problem-solving skills of learners in the areas of science, technology, engineering, mathematics and innovation (Stem) fields through engaging them in project-based learning.

It provides a platform for learners to display their research skills at science fairs where they are rewarded for their efforts. Learners who take part in these competitions are required to

create new innovations with these competitions starting from school level. Schools are encouraged to host their own science expos and thereafter learners participate in district and regional expos.

Majatji Dankuru, a mother of three and mathematics and science educator at Mapudithomo Primary School as well as a convener for the Eskom Expo for Young Scientists in Limpopo, travelled to Beijing, China on Friday, 23 March with one of the EEYS learners who will represent South Africa in the science fair competition in Beijing.

Dankuru has been doing science fairs for 13 years and she introduced

EEYS to Mapudithomo Primary School when she joined them in 2006.

"First became the circuit coordinator and then got selected to be a circuit judge. I later became a national judge and now I am a convener," she said.

"I am happy that the EEYS saw the potential in me and believed in me to represent South Africa at the science fair in Beijing."
