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1.1.1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 INTRODUCTION TO THE NRF

The National Research Foundation Act as amended, Act 19 of 2018, establishes the National Research Foundation (“NRF”) as the juristic legal entity that will contract with the awarded bidder. Please visit the NRF website (<https://www.nrf.ac.za>) for more information.

1.2 BACKGROUND TO SAASTA

The South African Agency for Science and Technology Advancement (NRF-SAASTA) is a business unit of the National Research Foundation. NRF-SAASTA’s mission is to promote broad public awareness, appreciation and understanding of science, engineering and technology in South Africa. NRF-SAASTA has also been appointed as the coordinator of the Science Engagement Strategy of 2015 by the Department of Science and Innovation.

1.3 CONTEXT

NRF-SAASTA, on behalf of the Department of Science and Innovation (DSI), organises a biennial STEMI Community of Practice Conference. The conference is usually held over three to four days. The next conference (to be held in May 2021) will most probably be held both virtually and physically in small clusters to observe the social distancing.

The Conference is dedicated to the advancement of the Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, and Innovation (STEMI) Olympiads and Competitions in South Africa by creating a community of practice where best practices are identified and benchmarked. This is achieved by bringing Olympiad and Competition organisers and other industry stakeholders together to present academic and non-academic research and talks, and to facilitate a platform for engagement between parties.

Objectives of the conference are:

- To positively contribute towards a STEMI-driven culture.
- To create a platform for collaborative problem solving.
- To act as a catalyst between people and organisations.
- To facilitate the development of tools to improve the connection between science and society.
- To assist in transforming innovative ideas and actions into benchmarked practices.

The conference has been in existence for four years and seek to expand its audience and reach, especially amongst researchers. The role of the editor is critical to facilitate the editorial process of the conference proceedings to ensure accreditation of the conference in line with the DHET policy of 2015 as accreditation is of utmost importance to researchers linked to a Higher Education Institution.

1.4 THE REQUIREMENTS OF THIS BID

The overall objective is to appoint an editor, i.e. a service provider/sole proprietor for the STEMI Community of Practice Conference submission proceedings for three (3) consecutive conferences to ultimately ensure accreditation of the Conference. The contracted service provider will work in collaboration with the Science Education Division of NRF-SAASTA.

2. PART A – BID REQUIREMENTS

2.1 SERVICES REQUIREMENT SPECIFICATIONS

Project Brief: NRF-SAASTA is looking for an experienced editor who will chair the evaluation panel of the submitted abstracts and finalise feedback comments to the candidates. The appointed editor will thus facilitate and manage the editorial role for conference e-publications as well as conduct article evaluations, facilitate the peer-review process and edit the publication for three consecutive conferences.

NRF-SAASTA will expect accurate and meticulous workmanship to enable the organisation to comply with the standards needed to obtain accreditation at DHET for academic papers delivered at the Conference.

The appointed editor will be expected, once the contract is signed, to ensure that all information regarding the presentations/papers are confidential and the property of DSI and SAASTA.

2.1.1 Scope and Responsibilities:

The appointed editor will be responsible to set up, lead and chair the peer review panel evaluations of the CoP conference submissions (all academic papers, short papers, workshops, posters and other presentations). Ensure that expert peer reviewers conduct evaluations, comment on and recommend suitable conference submissions. Finalise and coordinate feedback and comments to the candidates. Collect approved contributions from authors, Compile and edit the publication. Finally, sign off on the academic publications of the conference for three consecutive conferences, for commencing from 2021.

The Editor will:

1. Set up a peer review panel(s) and schedule the meetings together with the organisers of the STEM Community of Practice Conference to:
 - 1.1 Establish a system for effective and rapid peer review i.e. criteria and appropriate expertise
 - 1.2 Establish a policy on the conflict of interest for all involved in the publication
 - 1.3 Ensure that the submissions are compliant and consistent with the Conference Theme and the specifications in the Call for Papers, including taking into consideration that the author has followed the required structure and style convention for the presentations/papers
2. Design and /or improve templates for the submission of papers/presentations, and the Conference proceedings
3. Determine deadlines for submissions together with the conference organisers.
4. Facilitate the Call for Papers, which will take place periodically and when necessary.

5. Determine and/or improve criteria and guidelines to authors for preparing and submitting conference contributions, and provide a clear statement of the focus of the conference
6. Provide editorial decisions, feedback and outcomes of the evaluations to the authors, speedily without bias, consistently treating all authors with courtesy, objectivity, honesty, and transparency
7. Copy editing and proofreading of approved papers, presentations and the Conference proceedings by ensuring
 - Accuracy of the science, scientific and educational terminology used
 - The presentations/papers do not transgress any legal, moral or ethics regulations and prescripts
 - The author has followed the required structure and style convention for the presentations/papers
 - Grammar, spelling and format of the presentations/papers are correct
 - Correct referencing
 - Improve the structure and format of presentations/papers
8. Ensure that the proceedings adhere to the standards for accreditation of the Research Output Policy (2015) (DHET)
9. Ensure presentations/papers, which qualify, are ready for publication/submission to the science journal and/or any other journal as identified by the panel.
10. Be available on a part-time basis for up 240 hours per conference
11. Submit a written report periodically to the panel and organisers, and as required. Provide timeous and constructive feedback and guidance.
12. Verify and allocate a Digital Object Identifiers (DOI) to the articles, as well as the indication of ORCID's for authors.
13. Submit a written editor's report to the conference organisers

2.1.2 Requirements:

1. A Ph.D. or Masters' degree or senior researcher in STEM or STEM education with minimum five years' relevant experience post obtaining the degree. Knowledge and skills in the fields of Mathematics, Science, Engineering and Technology as well as experience in science editing and experience as a reviewer or an evaluator of academic papers for scientific journal(s) and/or conference proceedings.
2. Proven experience in academic and scientific scholarly publishing including proof of Publication record of a number of articles and /or books in the STEM and/or STEM education field – List the 10 most recent articles and books
3. Has been an editor and/or peer reviewer of peer-reviewed journal or academic conference or professional association conference
4. The person must have/had an affiliation with a university or research council or similar research institution (e.g. independent think tank)
5. Familiar and experienced with the South African National system of Innovation and Research Output Policy (DHET, 2015).
6. High quality writing skills
7. Expertise and experience in the specialist field of STEM and/or STEM education
8. Committed and willing to work under pressure and with short deadlines

9. Proficient and strong skills in academic editing focus (especially, as the vision is to ensure that academics will get DHET recognition for these submissions)
10. Excellent command of English, both oral and written.
11. Great attention to detail i.e. accuracy.
12. Must be able to travel and NRF-SAASTA will make the arrangements and take care of the costs.

2.1.3 Recommendations

1. Have served on the local organising committee of an academic conference or professional association conference
2. Member of a professional body such as SACNASP / SASA/ SAMS /ECSA / AMESA

2.2 DUE DILIGENCE

2.2. Detailed requirements to evaluate the bidder's ability to deliver on the bid. The bidder must provide the following:

2.2.1 Personal Profile/Resume:

A summarised personal profile which entails all the requirements stipulated under paragraph 2.1.2, relevant to the task at hand, **limited to a maximum of 10 pages**. Relevant experience should be clearly stated in view of the scope, responsibilities and requirements listed.

2.2.2 Proof of qualifications (Certified copies)

2.2.3 Proof of membership of professional bodies where/if applicable

2.2.4 Quotation/Budget

2.2.4.1 Indicate the rate per hour based on the number of hours as indicated under "Scope and Responsibilities".

2.2.4.2 The quotation must be separate per each year starting from 2021 and ending 2025

2.2.4.3 The quotation must be VAT inclusive

2.2.4.4 Must be a South African registered company

2.2.5 References - Relevant letters, on original referee letterheads, with contact details

2.3 Ethical requirements

The bidder must confirm that there are no interests with the NRF and its business units, has clean business practises, and has determined its bid independently from others as reflected in the submitted SBD 1, SBD 4, SBD 8, and SBD 9 forms.

3 CONTRACT PERIOD

The renewable contract is for a period of three (3) consecutive conferences, starting from November 2020

4 CONTRACT MANAGEMENT

Contract management during implementation. NRF-SAASTA reserves the right:

- to withdraw and cancel the bid.
- not to accept the lowest proposal.
- If the Service Provider fail to deliver within deadlines as specified in service requirements specifications, the Service Provider will be liable for any costs incurred by NRF-SAASTA to complete the job by a third party.
- General conditions of contract will be applicable to this bid.
- All costs incurred for submission of the invitation to bid is for the bidder's account.

Termination of contract due to non-performance

In the event of the non-performance as per the agreed contract, NRF-SAASTA will appoint an alternative at the cost of the appointed third party. The defaulting third party is obliged to settle the damages/additional costs that NRF-SAASTA has incurred as result of the non-performance of the appointed bidder. NRF-SAASTA reserves the right to terminate the contract due to poor performance.

Occupational Health and Safety when working on NRF sites:

All personnel performing work on NRF-SAASTA site/s as part of this contract are responsible to obtain safety induction.

Over and above the obligations provided by the Occupational Health and Safety Act (OHS Act No 85 of 1993 and its Regulations, known as 'the Act'), the appointed bidder meets with all relevant health and safety instructions as given to them by site safety personnel, where relevant. Personal protection equipment including closed safety shoes, hard hats, height safety equipment, and high visibility vests are worn at all times while on the work site. All personnel are to obey the relevant instructions, including signage, related to restricted access and speed limits on all sites.

The appointed bidder, once signing the contract (SBD 7 and the NRF's Section 37.2 agreement), is responsible for itself, its employees, and those people affected by its operations in terms of the Act the regulations promulgated in terms thereof. The appointed bidder performs all work and uses equipment on site complying with the provisions of the Act.

To this end, the appointed bidder shall make available to SAASTA on the valid Letter of Good Standing in terms of the COID Act and ensures its validity does not expire while executing this bid, where applicable. The appointed bidder furnishes its registration number with the office of the Compensation Commissioner. The appointed bidder maintains a health and safety plan complying with the requirements of The Act at the work site during the period that contracted work takes place on the site.

SAASTA manages the appointed bidder in his capacity for the execution of this contract to meet the provisions of the said Act and the regulations promulgated in terms thereof. The appointed bidder accepts liability for any contraventions to the Act. Each member of the appointed bidder's team (including sub-contracted personnel), submit a signed indemnity form prior to entering the work site and kept in the appointed bidder's health and safety file.

Original bid documents for contract signing

The sets of original bid documents in hard copy format (paper document) serves as the original master set for the legal contract document between the contracting parties. The master set remains at the NRF and has precedence over any other copies in the case of any discrepancies within the other sets of

documents. The master set has the originals or certified copies of any certificates stipulated in this document attached.

Managing service levels

Upon appointment, both parties agree on the final set of performance levels for each deliverable service levels including measurable key performance indicators with minimum thresholds in writing which is appended to this contract document.

Where both parties agree to variation of these, both parties sign the revision which is appended to this contract document.

The appointed third party and the SAASTA contract manager measure delivered performance against these performance levels.

Where either party has identified poor performance under this contract, both parties will meet and investigate the matter to determine the root cause, the correction plan, and the execution planning thereof.

Both parties will monitor the corrective actions.

Both parties will assess the applicability of penalties to the incurred poor performance and apply these,

5. GENERAL AND SPECIAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT

In this document words in the singular also mean in the plural and vice versa, words in the masculine mean in the feminine and neuter, words "department" means organs of state inclusive of public entities and vice versa, and the words "will/should" mean "must".

The National Research Foundation cannot amend the National Treasury's General Conditions of Contract (GCC). The National Research Foundation compiles separate Special Conditions of Contract (SCC) relevant to this bid where applicable supplementing the General Conditions of Contract. Where there is conflict, the provisions of the Special Conditions of Contract shall prevail.

GCC 1	Definitions - The following terms shall be interpreted as indicated:
1.1	"Closing time" means the date and hour specified in the bidding documents for the receipt of bids.
1.2	"Contract" means the written agreement entered into between the purchaser and the supplier, as recorded in the contract form signed by the parties, including all attachments and appendices thereto and all documents incorporated by reference therein.
1.3	"Contract price" means the price payable to the supplier under the contract for the full and proper performance of his contractual obligations.
1.4	"Corrupt practice" means the offering, giving, receiving, or soliciting of anything of value to influence the action of a public official in the procurement process or in contract execution.
1.5	"Countervailing duties" are imposed in cases where an enterprise abroad is subsidized by its government and encouraged to market its products internationally.
1.6	"Country of origin" means the place where the goods were mined, grown, or produced, or from which the services are supplied. Goods produced when, through manufacturing, processing or substantial and major assembly of components, a commercially recognized new product results that is substantially different in basic characteristics or in purpose or utility from its components
1.7	"Day" means calendar day.
1.8	"Delivery" means delivery in compliance of the conditions of the contract or order.
1.9	"Delivery ex stock" means immediate delivery directly from stock actually on hand.
1.10	"Delivery into consignees store or to his site" means delivered and unloaded in the specified store or depot or on the specified site in compliance with the conditions of the contract or order, the supplier bearing all risks and charges involved until the supplies are so delivered and a valid receipt is obtained.
1.11	"Dumping" occurs when a private enterprise abroad market its goods on own initiative in the RSA at lower prices than that of the country of origin and which have the potential to harm the local industries in the RSA.
1.12	"Force majeure" means an event beyond the control of the supplier and not involving the supplier's fault or negligence and not foreseeable. 1.13	"Fraudulent practice" means a misrepresentation of facts in order to influence a procurement process or the execution of a contract to the detriment of any bidder, and includes collusive practice among bidders (prior to or after bid submission) designed to establish bid prices at artificial non-competitive levels and to deprive the bidder of the benefits of free and open competition.

7.1	Within thirty days (30) of receipt of the notification of contract award, the successful bidder shall furnish to the purchaser the performance security of the amount specified in SCC.
